OLLI members tend to be avid readers. We've asked a random group, "What did you read over the summer?" Here are some of the replies (which have been edited for length and clarity). More in future newsletters.

Larry Walders: I read *Everybody's Fool* by Richard Russo. It follows his best seller *Nobody's Fool*.

Both are set on a depressed area of upstate New York with a cast of bizarre characters who go through episodes of hilarious and semi-tragic experiences. The writing is entertaining and also provides insights into small-town life.

Dorothy Wexler: I did a mishmash of reading this summer. I started with a book I've been longing to get to: Leningrad, Siege and Symphony by Brian Moynahan, a long book focused on Shostakovich composing his Seventh Symphony during the siege of Leningrad, following up with the new novel by Julian Barnes, *The Noise of Time*, also about Shostakovich. The Barnes was a present as were a couple of other books I read: A Thousand Miles to Freedom, by Eunsun Kim about her escape from North Korea and *Memories from Moscow to the Black Sea,* by the Russian journalist "Teffi." For book groups I belong to, I read the extraordinary World War I novel by the Irish author Sebastian Barry, A Long Long Way and Disraeli: The Novel Politician by David Cesarini, which examines how "Jewish" Disraeli was. Then for fun: Love in a Cold Climate by Nancy Mitford and *Imperium: A Novel of Ancient Rome,* by the incomparable Robert Harris (in anticipation of the Roman history class which I was lucky to get into).

Robert Adamson: What I read this summer:
Andrew Solomon, Far From The Tree; Dara Horn, A
Guide For the Perplexed and On All Other Nights; M.L.
Stedman, A Light Between the Oceans; Anne Tyler, A
Hole to America; Thomas Buergenthal, A Lucky Child,
and Dalia Sofer The Septembers of Shiraz.

Peter MacGahan: Flashpoints, by George Friedman, The Garments of the Court and Palace, by Philip Bobbitt, and The Jewish Gospel of John, by Eli Lizorkin-Eyzenberg.

Peter Sherman: I read *Waiting*, by Ha Jin. Highly recommend this novel set in China during the cultural revolution; *The Heart is a Lonely Hunter*, by Carson McCullers, a classic well worth reading or rereading, and David Brooks' *Road to Character*.

Linda Roeder: Between the World and Me, by Ta Nehisi Coates; Wolf Hall, by Hilary Mantel; The Sympathizer, by Viet Thanh Nguyen; Devil in the White City, by Erik Larson; All the Light We Cannot See, by Anthony Doerr; The Secret River, by Kate Grenville; and Euphoria, by Lily King.
