Student Essay Contest: Climate Change

Recently, *The Washington Post* included an article about Alexandria Villasenor, a 7th grader who has been sitting outside of the UN Headquarters for weeks with signs asking adults to do something serious about climate change. The article talks about other young people's activities and a global strike they are organizing to demand action. **OLLI member Ron Ridker is a member of an organization called** *Global Peace Service-USA* **that has decided to start an essay contest for high school and middle school students to write about their feelings about climate change and what they would like to see done about it. A committee of experts will judge the essays and prizes will be given out. Ron is asking for help with this program, which will include contacting school teachers to encourage them to enter the contest, raise funds for prizes, and other ideas about how to run the contest. - March 15. The Board's approved list of candidates is sent to members.
- *April 8.* Deadline for at-large candidate to submit self-nomination petitions, complete with 10 supporting signatures, to the Office.
- *April 26.* OLLI Annual Meeting. Each candidate will be allowed 2-3 minutes to address the group.
- April 26 May 10. Online voting takes place.
- May 13. Results of the election are announced.

Warning from the Social Security Administration

The Social Security Administration asked various organizations to share this message:

We have become aware of reports of fraudulent telephone calls from individuals claiming to represent the Social Security Administration (SSA). In them, unknown callers are using threatening language to warn unknowing victims that they will be arrested or face other legal action if they fail to call a provided phone number or press the number indicated in the message to address the issue. In some instances, these unknown callers switch tactics and communicate that they want to help an individual with activating a suspended Social Security number. **Such calls are a scam, and are not coming from official SSA representatives.**

Social Security is committed to protecting the privacy and security of the people we serve. SSA states that no one should engage with such callers, and to report any suspicious calls to Social

Security's Office of the Inspector General **by calling 1-800-269-0271** or <u>submitting a report</u> on the OIG website. SSA also urges you to read and share our <u>Social Security Matters blog</u>, which provides more information on the nature of these fraudulent calls, as well as instructions on how to report such activity.
