
Preliminary Class Feedback

Update on Election of Board Members

Under the OLLI by-laws (revised in 2018), the Committee on Nominations and Elections, after consulting with and inviting recommendations from OLLI members in general, has developed a list of four candidates to fill the four open Board positions. The Committee believes these candidates have amply demonstrated the skills, experience, background and energy needed for the important work of the Board. The list, which the Board has approved, will appear on the ballot for the election that begins in late April. The Committee would like to thank all those OLLI members who provided the many excellent recommendations for Committee consideration.



John Aldock. John joined OLLI two years ago after retiring as General Counsel of Goodwin Proctor LLP, an international law firm. He has served on the OLLI Finance Committee and assisted the OLLI Chair in negotiations with AU over space in our new building and the OLLI endowment. He previously served as Assistant U.S. Attorney for D.C., Chair of the Shea and Gardner law firm, Chair of the Advisory Committee on Rules of the U.S. District Court for D.C. and for many years as a member of the Board of the Legal Clinic for the Homeless.



Myra Barron. Myra is a current Board member seeking a second term. She is on the Executive Committee and co-chairs the AU Relationship Committee. Previously she has served as Board Chair, Vice Chair, Treasurer, and Personnel Committee Chair. A lawyer by profession, she has worked in both the public sector — with stints as Assistant County Attorney and as Counsel to the Fairfax County Redevelopment and Housing Authority — and in the private sector, where she specialized in affordable housing and represented non-profits in business and related matters. She has degrees from Smith (BA), Johns Hopkins (MA), and Georgetown (JD).



Linda Kiser. Currently a member of the Development Committee, Linda has been an OLLI member since 2012. She has extensive development experience, having spent many years as Director of Development in several local private schools and having served on various school and non-profit Boards as Chair/member of development committees. Prior to that, she had several years of public service, working with both the U.S. House and the Senate and for the Carter Administration. She currently serves as a tutor at The Academy of Hope, a charter school for adults working to get their GED.



Mark Nadel. Mark joined OLLI in 2012 and since then has taught several different courses on public policy. He is currently on the Curriculum Committee and has helped in the orientation of new SGLs. Previously, he taught political science at Cornell before joining the Government Accountability Office. He ended his federal career as an Associate Commissioner of Social Security. Since retiring, he has taught public policy at Georgetown and was a senior fellow at Georgetown's Government Affairs Institute. He has degrees from California (BA) and Johns Hopkins (PhD).

Next Steps

April 8. Members interested in being placed on the ballot as at-large candidates can do so by filing a self-nomination petition supported by the signatures of 10 OLLI members. Candidates meeting the 10-member signature requirement will automatically appear on the ballot. The deadline for submitting at-large petitions is April 8. As part of the petition, candidates should provide a photo (a smartphone photo will be fine) and a brief bio of no more than 100 words. Interested candidates should contact the Office for the petition form and other details.

April 26. OLLI annual meeting. Candidates will be allowed 2-3 minutes to introduce themselves.

April 26 - May 10. The election takes place online.

May 13. The results are announced.

Student Essay Contest: Climate Change

Recently, *The Washington Post* included an article about Alexandria Villasenor, a 7th grader who has been sitting outside of the UN Headquarters for weeks with signs asking adults to do something serious about climate change. The article talks about other young people's activities and a global strike they are organizing to demand action. **OLLI member Ron Ridker is a member of an organization called** *Global Peace Service-USA* that has decided to start an essay contest for high school and middle school students to write about their feelings about climate change and what they would like to see done about it. A committee of experts will judge the essays and prizes will be given out.
