### **Support Environmental Sustainability**

A class member in the June Mini “Wildlife Conservation” suggested that OLLI let its members know about some of AU’s sustainability efforts. Study group leader Heather Heckel provided us with the information below that we’re excited to pass it on to you.

In 2018, American University became the first university in the US to achieve carbon neutrality. The campus has many sustainability efforts including use of renewable energy, carbon offsetting, LEED buildings (that have been designed, constructed, operated, and/or maintained to more efficiently use resources), green roofs, pursuit of zero waste, and a campus food garden. AU is also a nationally recognized Arboretum. You can read about more ways in which AU is a leader in sustainability [here](#).

There are many opportunities for the OLLI community to engage in environmental sustainability at AU, including:

#### **Recycling**

- o batteries on the second floor (next to the elevators) and by the back door of Room A
- o plastic bags by the back door of Room A

- o food for compost and mixed recycling in the lobby
- o printer cartridges and cell phones at AU's library

### **Reusing**

- o Bring a reusable water bottle or coffee mug to class with you
- o Use reusable utensils and avoid single-use plastic when eating in the Social Space

### **Transportation**

- o Walk to OLLI if you live nearby
- o Take public transportation or carpool with other members
- o Use AU's bus system, powered partially by biofuel produced on campus from AU food waste.

##### **AVATAR: Figurative Sculpture Class with Melissa Ichiuji**

**Two Day Intensive Workshop, August 3 & 4, 10AM-4PM**

In this two-day workshop participants will have a hands-on opportunity to work with one of DC's most dynamic sculptors, Melissa Ichiuji, known for her visceral, emotionally charged, and doll-like sculptures. Ichiuji will demonstrate her method of building a figure from the inside out using found materials, textiles, and meaningful artifacts. Participants will use movement, sketching and guided visualization to unlock the body and mind and learn techniques to create a uniquely personal AVATAR sculpture. Cost for the class is \$275 (all materials included).

Melissa Ichiuji is an American artist based in Virginia. Her art explores themes relating to empowerment and fragility. She has exhibited in museums and galleries in Paris, Brussels, Munich, Berlin, NYC and Washington, DC. ***Being Here as ME - New Media Art Exhibition of Women Artists from Taiwan***

Being Here as ME presents six women artists striving towards constructions of female subjectivity. Pey-Chwen Lin, Tzu-Ning Wu, Yung-Chieh Wu, I-Chun Chen, Pei-Shih Tu, and Hui-Chan Kuo create new media artworks through diverse mediums and methods. Their work transcends gender discussions, and through social strategies, action, and engagement they express their concerns and create artworks revealing their anxiety and opinions about the ecology of society, science, technology and the environment.

***Plans to Prosper You: Reflections of Black Resistance and Resilience in Montgomery County's Potomac River Valley***

**June 15-August 11, 2019**

The exhibition title takes its name from bible verse Jeremiah 29:11 to echo the central role of the Black church in bringing communities together, inspiring hope, and acting as a vector for social change. The goal of this exhibition is to offer a space of learning and meditation that highlights the Black history of Montgomery County and western Washington, DC and pay homage to the communities who championed fights against racial discrimination through faith, family, and fellowship. While this exhibition highlights the communities of Scotland, Tobytown, and Macedonia-Moses, we hope that Plans to Prosper You will inspire similar exhibitions and continue to prompt in-depth collaboration within and beyond these communities.

Passages: Keith Morrison, 1999-2019 surveys thirty paintings and watercolors by the Jamaican-born Keith Morrison.
