The National Cathedral is one of the crown jewels of Washington, DC. While many of us have had the pleasure of visiting the Cathedral and hearing its story, there are many sights unavailable to the average visitor. This tour will take us to areas not available on the general public tour. Discover the Cathedral's hidden stories on the behind-the-scenes tour as you marvel at the building's artistry and engineering. Journey through stone stairwells and passageways to see stained glass windows up close and magnificent views from the heights. Be prepared for stair climbing, close quarters, and heights. ## **Trip to Virginia Museum of Fine Arts**

We will be taking a trip to Richmond, VA on Friday, January 24, 2020 to the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts (VMFA) and explore the premiere of the Edward Hopper and the American Hotel exhibition, the first in-depth study of hospitality settings depicted in the works of one of the most celebrated American artists. Edward Hopper (1882-1967) found artistic value and cultural significance in the most commonplace sites and settings. Hopper's spare depictions of familiar public and private spaces are often understood within the contexts of isolation, loneliness, and ennui of early and mid-20th-century America. Join us to get an exclusive glimpse of Hopper's immersion into the world of hotels, motels, hospitality services, and mobility in general. The exhibition has simulated spaces and other unique design components, including an actual functional hotel room. Please note that refunds for trips are available only if the trip is cancelled. We will meet at a location, later to be determined, at 8:00 AM to board a chartered bus. The tour starts at 11:00 AM. We will return from VA to DC by 8:00 PM. To register, click <u>here</u>.

### **Lecture Series**

There are still seats left in next week's lecture. Next Friday, November 22, the topic will be *Lost Farms and Estates of Washington, DC*, given by Kim Williams, an architectural historian. Kim Williams has over 25 years of experience researching historic buildings and places in the DC area. She currently serves as the National Register Coordinator for the DC Historic Preservation Office where she identifies and evaluates properties for listing in the DC Inventory of Historic Sites and the National Register of Historic Places. In the process, Kim has conducted large scale cultural resources surveys and has discovered more than 70 buildings, objects and remnants of buildings still standing from the city's rural beginnings. In 2018, Kim published a book on the city's rural heritage, *Lost Farms and Estates* of Washington, DC, the topic of today's talk, and is currently working on another publication on the city's historic alleyways and alley buildings. of the Treasury, and Senator from 1902 to 1945. Glass authored three of our most important

financial laws: The Federal Reserve Act of 1913, The Glass-Steagall Act of 1933, and The Securities Exchange Act of 1934. The issues that Glass dealt with are with us today. Our current president is threatening to fire the Federal Reserve Board chairman because he disagrees with its policies; and in 1999, Congress repealed the Glass-Steagall Act's provisions prohibiting banks from engaging in securities.

### LATE FALL EXHIBITIONS & EVENTS AT THE AU MUSEUM-KATZEN ARTS CENTER

*Open Tuesday-Sunday, 11:00 AM - 4:00 PM Free and fully accessible Radical Link: A New Community of Women, 1855-2020* Curated by Sarah Gordon November 9-December 15, 2019

*Radical Link* is the latest project by Tel Aviv-based multi-media artist Michal Heiman. Traversing time, space, gender, race, and institutional practices of asylum, Heiman offers a new way to extend solidarity to those who engage in acts of resistance by creating a new community. It includes women who have been subjugated by the Surrey County Asylum in London, and the San Servolo Asylum in Venice, asylum seekers, artists, activists, prosecutors, gatekeepers, and those who have suffered under the violence of racism and misogyny. Through the strategies of intervention and the use of archival materials, photographs, films, sound work, and her presence in the gallery, she generates the political, cultural, gendered, and psychic conditions of a

potential "radical link."

The exhibition is accompanied by a fully illustrated book, including essays by curator Sarah Gordon; Sharon Sliwinski, Professor of Information and Media Studies at the University of Western Ontario; Orna Ben-Naftali, Émile Zola Chair for Human Rights and Lecturer at the Haim Striks School of Law; and artist Michal Heiman.

#### Dark World: Photographs by Frank Hallam Day

### November 9-December 15, 2019

Over the past dozen years, Frank Hallam Day's personal work has been devoted largely to exploring the world at night. The visually intriguing dark world offers mysteries and ambiguities, and lends itself to the introspective creative space he prefers. His work comments on a number of salient themes: the relationship between contemporary society and nature and the pace of technological change, aging, isolation, and obsolescence. The markedly formal, unabashedly elegiac images also investigate influences from the history of painting to a degree unusual in contemporary photography. Day's work has been described as "intimate yet subtly epic." He looks for an "annunciatory light" transforming everyday things, like plastic market bags and public phones, into objects of special significance. In the words of Louis Jacobson at the Washington City Paper, he "showers a ray of almost spiritual light into the night's dark corners."

### Topographies of Life: Pam Rogers, Lynn Sures, Mel Watkin September 3-December 15, 2019

#### **Curated by Jennifer Riddell, Presented by the AU Museum Project Space**

Using the medium of drawing to varied and distinctive effect, Rogers, Sures, and Watkin trace human connections to the natural world—across time and varied landscapes. The three artists work from both a consciousness of drawing's ties to illustration and evidence; and, the medium's unique ability to transmit the artist's "hand" and personal response to their subject. From the deserts of Kenya, forests of the Midwest, to the Potomac watershed, these artists are deeply attuned to the mutually affecting relationship between the anthropological and natural worlds.
