

Safety in Room A: The Lecture Hall

Please take your time and look carefully when going up or down steps in Room A. If you have a vision impairment, please ask others for assistance. Non-skid caution tape has been added to the top level to mark the step down, as well as to all of the steps on the back stairs, and to the ramp on the far side of the room. In addition, caution tape of a color combination other than yellow and black has been added to the steps adjacent to the ramps on either side of the room going from the first level to the upper levels.

Coronavirus

As we start the new semester and there are some concerns about the spread of Coronavirus, please be assured that OLLI is following American University's and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's advice. We have posted reminders in classrooms and social spaces on how to stay healthy, but the current recommendations are best summarized as follows:

- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, or use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol if soap and water are not available
- Cover your coughs and sneezes with a sleeve or tissue
- If you are sick, stay home and clean frequently touched objects (phones, keyboards, television remotes, etc.)

We put hand sanitizers in each room and have more on back order. Until we receive the new order, if you have a personal size hand sanitizer, it would be helpful if you carried that around with you, whenever possible.

Warning from Social Security Inspector General

The Inspector General of Social Security, Gail S. Ennis, is warning of a new tactic by government imposters to reach — and victimize — Americans by phone. We have received reports of text messages on cell phones that appear to come from Social Security. The texts warn about a Social Security number problem. They ask the recipient to call a number back to resolve the problem and avoid legal action.

This trick appears to be the latest development in continuing widespread scams meant to deceive Americans into providing money and personal information to scammers. Social Security will never send a text asking for a return call to an unknown number. Social Security will only send text messages if you have opted in to receive texts from the agency and only in limited situations, including the following:

- When you have requested or subscribed to receive updates and notifications from Social Security by text.
- As part of Social Security's enhanced security when accessing your personal my Social Security account.

Our office wants you to know Social Security will never:

- Threaten you with arrest or other legal action unless you immediately pay a fine or fee.
- Promise a benefit increase or other assistance in exchange for payment.
- Require payment by retail gift card, wire transfer, internet currency, or by mailing cash.
- Send official letters or reports containing your personal information via email.

If you owe money to Social Security, the agency will mail you a letter with payment options and appeal rights. You should never pay a government fee or fine using retail gift cards, cash, internet currency, wire transfers, or pre-paid debit cards.

Reminder to Update Your Cell Phone Number

Please check your member record and update your cell number if necessary. You also can email or call the OLLI office to update it. Sometimes we send alerts via text, so we need current cell numbers.
