

Letter from the Chair



Greetings from Judy Havemann, the new chair of the board of OLLI at AU. I am delighted to be working with all of you. First, a big thank you to Martha Cutts, who did a masterful job of steering the OLLI ship as we moved almost overnight last winter from in-person instruction to brand new technology for many of us.

In the first meeting of the new board, several decisions were made about the Fall semester. Here is the news.

- All OLLI classes will be offered on ZOOM when the semester begins in September. We will not be offering any classes or lectures in the Spring Valley Building through January 2021.
- Our Study Group Leaders will offer a full range of 95 classes on topics ranging from politics, law and government, to music and art, and to literature, history, science and philosophy.

- The course catalogue will be online and registration for fall classes will open on July 10.
- Many Fall courses will accommodate more participants than they could in person.
- OLLI will restore the popular Friday lecture series on Zoom, featuring such lecturers as film historian Glenn Frankel and former Obama administration White House Counsel Neil Eggleston.
- OLLI will add new Serendipities—one-time talks on subjects of interest to, and often by, our members.
- OLLI will reconvene the OLLI Book Club.
- OLLI will feature special experimental programs during the summer and early fall, such as OLLI coffees, where members can chat in small groups in a virtual social space.
- OLLI will reach out to former members who have moved away or who have found transportation difficult, as well as to others in the community. We will seek to make our classes as broadly accessible and diverse as possible.
- OLLI will offer a 10 percent, that is a \$30 reduction, in the Fall membership fee.
- OLLI will continually assess the conditions at American University and in the city and region as we seek to maintain the OLLI educational experience you have helped us create. Our aim is safety, accessibility, and flexibility. We will keep you abreast of the situation as it develops.

We are grateful to our staff for their hard work—entirely from home—during this period. Our remarkable Study Group Leaders have risen to the occasion and studied and practiced on technology that is new to many of them. A volunteer tech team has helped many of us familiarize ourselves with Zoom. All of this will continue throughout the summer.

Thank you, OLLI members, for your support and loyalty. I look forward to a great 2020-2021 academic year together. I'm a new Text block ready for your content.

try Google Chrome instead. Then, join the meeting again. If you have multiple devices, for example, a laptop and a tablet, download Zoom on each device. If one device doesn't work, try another.
