

The United Nations - Friend or Foe? Superfluous or Necessary?

E. Michael Southwick

This lecture will provide a brief historical overview of the "problem of peace," i.e., how nations over the centuries have tried to avoid war. E. Michael Southwick will describe America's interactions with the international community, starting with George Washington's warning about avoiding entangling alliances to the decision in 1945 to be a founding member of the United Nations. Among the significant issues and developments in this relationship to be discussed will be the Korean War,

human rights, and humanitarian operations.

Ambassador Southwick served as a US diplomat for 36 years, beginning in 1967. He had seven overseas assignments: Kathmandu, Kigali, Geneva, Bujumbura, Niamey, Nairobi, and Kampala. He was Deputy Chief of Mission at three African posts and from 1994 to 1997 was ambassador to Uganda.

Yeats Now: Echoing Into Life with Joe Hassett Thursday, October 29 - 3:30-4:30 PM via Zoom

W. B. Yeats often has just the right words for important occasions. Yeats scholar and author Joe Hassett will discuss memorable lines from Yeats's poetry that help us articulate our thoughts about significant moments in our own lives. Inviting Yeats into our lives line by line turns out to be an easy point of entry into the work of this astonishingly vital poet.

Joe Hassett is a Washington trial lawyer and author. His books include W. B. Yeats and the Muses and The Ulysses Trials: Beauty and Truth Meet the Law. Joe attended Canisius College, Harvard Law School, and University College Dublin (PhD).

Serendipity! Tues., Nov. 10 Franklin & Winston, Nick Glakas

Franklin & Winston - The Partnership That Saved the World with Nick Glakas Tuesday, November 10 - 3:30-4:30 PM via Zoom

The epic friendship and extraordinary partnership of Franklin Roosevelt and Winston Churchill was played out over the course of nine meetings totaling 113 days over a six-year period from September 1939 until FDR's death in April 1945. Their meetings took them around the world, from Washington to Quebec, from Cairo to Casablanca, from Marrakesh to Tehran, from Malta to Yalta. It was no easy task for one of them who was paralyzed below the waist and confined to a wheelchair or the other whose age, health and work habits were of constant concern to his family, friends and doctors. This lecture will examine their nine meetings and the issues they resolved to win the war and establish a new course for a future peace.

Nick Glakas is a retired lawyer and Smithsonian lecturer. For the past 8 years, he has lectured on cruise ships around the world as well as at Cambridge, Georgetown and George Washington universities. He has clerked for 2 federal judges, served as general counsel of the Senate Appropriations Committee and been senior vice president of ITT Corporation. He is a former naval officer who served aboard a destroyer and an LST in the Mekong Delta, later attending law school at

Georgetown and Cambridge University.

Christo, with his wife, turned epic-scale environmental works into temporary popular art. Across continents, they used mountains, islands, farmlands, museums, and bridges. For Christo his esthetics was the process — workers, politics, negotiations, and construction difficulties. Envisage Andy Warhol and you see soup cans, Marilyn Monroe, videos, and gender-bending art. As portraitist, publisher, publicist, and salesman, he built a branded enterprise. We'll view videos, critique art, and compare personalities.

Carl Weichel has held various positions over his career in marketing, design, and advertising in Australia, South Africa, Canada, and San Francisco, and continues to consult. Carl has led OLLI study groups on Political Polarization, The 1960s, Eastern Religions and Philosophies, and Our Hidden Brain.
