Notes from 2017 Town Hall



We had a robust, engaged turnout for our town meeting on Oct. 27. For those of you who did not attend, here is a summary.

WHERE ARE WE?

AU Relationship. We have had a longstanding

relationship with AU. AU professors enhance our curriculum. More than 40 OLLI members are AU alumni and emeriti professors. We have a financial connection to AU through the Bernard Osher Foundation, which has funded university-affiliated Osher Institutes across the US. AU received on our behalf \$1 million in 2008 and an additional \$950K in 2016. The AU Osher Endowment is now approximately \$2.225 million, from which OLLI receives yearly distributions from its earnings. We are in the second year of a 10-year lease with shared space in AU's Spring Valley Building, and we recently changed our name to "OLLI at AU."

Academic Excellence. Of the 120 OLLIs nationwide, we are one of the top two or three with respect to our strong academic curriculum. This fall, we have 90 study groups and nearly 1,000 members. Combining both semesters, February Shorts, and June Minis, we'll have over 1,300 members this year. We have achieved this growth with only 5 full-time, paid staff, making us practically an "all-volunteer" college!

Building Community. As a "commuter" college, we strive to develop a sense of community. This

Financial Matters. About 75% of our operating budget comes from tuition. Our annual earnings distribution on the Osher Endowment, through AU, goes towards the balance of expenses. We also can draw from our "Friends of OLLI" Reserve Fund's \$1 million, made up of donations, gifts, etc. This reserve fund is also used for capital expenditures, such as the cost of installing hearing loops in our six classrooms. To accommodate our growth, including 144 new members this fall, we need more classroom space and/or hours, as well as expensive software updates. To meet these needs, we are beginning a \$150,000 fundraising effort, Campaign 2020, with a final goal of \$1.5 million over the next few years.

WHERE ARE WE GOING?

In August, we were awarded a highly competitive Compass grant worth \$150,000 of consulting services. Our Compass team leader, Patrice Feinstein, assisted by several nonprofit specialists will help us better align our resources, programs, and mission. The Strategic Planning Committee is developing a strategic plan, due in June. Tentative goals will address growth, space, diversity, and building community. Whether you prefer that OLLI at AU grows and changes or stays as it is, we will seek your views through focus groups and/or a survey.

Questions. Attendees raised a number of issues. One concern is the limited number of seats available at weekly lectures. Some urged that OLLI members be given preference over non-members for lecture reservations. The Board will consider this

at its November meeting. Another concern was our limited space. We have the six classrooms on the Fifth Floor plus the auditorium on the First Floor. We are beginning discussions with AU to address our need for additional classroom space and hours. Another inquiry concerned how OLLI members could access AU facilities. Look for this on the OLLI website, on the “Benefits of Membership” page under the “Membership” menu.

Parking. Dan Nichols, AU Executive Director of Risk, Safety and Transportation Programs, along with Andrew Huff of AU Community Relations, addressed AU parking policies. As Mr. Nichols explained, **the DC Zoning Commission, not AU,** requires the entire AU community, including OLLI members, to follow the “Good Neighbor Policy.” No map showing neighborhood boundaries exists because there are no specific limitations. When visiting AU, even with a DC Zone 3 sticker, OLLI members must park in the garage or at metered spaces. AU is required to issue parking tickets to vehicles violating the policy, and the first ticket is \$200. If you live in the neighborhood and AU accidentally tickets your car when parked in front of your house, call the parking office at 202-885-3111. The parking office will delete the fine and add your license plate to a DO NOT TICKET list in their database. To sum up, the rule is simple: If visiting AU, park on AU property.

Mr. Nichols also said the parking staff will consider providing parking permits for OLLI members, in addition to the use of kiosks and the parking phone app. OLLI staff will follow up with him.
