The Existential Situation

God is Dead World is essentially meaningless, In the face of death, nothing has meaning existence precedes essence No transcendent meaning Absurdity Nausea Nothingness

In the face of the Existential Situation, individuals experience feelings of: Hopelessness, Angst, (anguish), Alienation

Suicide as a response is just as absurd as any other action.

Kakfa's "Before the Law" is an expression of existentialism.

For the masses, they cannot live in an existential reality, so they create sustaining illusions (such as God) or pipe-dreams.

The Existential Solution

However, for the existential hero, the realization that EXISTENCE PRECEDES ESSENCE is LIBERATING. Creates ULTIMATE, LIMITLESS, AND COMPLETE FREEDOM.
Therefore, TOTAL RESPONSIBILITY IS PLACED ON THE INDIVIDUAL FOR ALL CHOICES MADE.
TO NOT MAKE A CHOICE IS A CHOICE.

WORK VS. REWARD

The Existential Hero must try to create meaning with the full understanding that his meaning is solely for the individual alone, is not transcendent to anyone else, and is only useable for the moment.

GOOD FAITH The accept what you have done (not thought, willed or desired) To accept responsibility for your actions.

To not choose is a choice.

BAD FAITH

The unwillingness to accept responsibility for one's acts and to ascribe personal responsibility to someone outside the self as the "cause of one's own servile condition."
