### **REGISTRATION IS OPEN!**

The February Shorts and spring semester registration is open! There are more courses than ever before—112 spring courses and 39 February Shorts!

OLLI is continuing to offer classes in three formats: **in-person, online,** and **hybrid.** The format for each course is listed online and in the print catalog.

The February Shorts & spring catalog will be in the mail early next week! Look for your copy in your mailbox soon. In the meantime, look at classes and register online or click the catalog image to see a pdf of the catalog.

### **FEBRUARY SHORTS**

The February Shorts will be held for two weeks: February 3-7 and 10-14. Each short course runs for 2-5 days during one of the two weeks. You may register for up to three courses in the lottery for the \$100 fee. **Your courses do not have to be all within the same week.** After the lottery, once you receive your class assignment letter, you can add additional courses—as many open courses as fit in your schedule—by logging into your OLLI account. To take more courses, you can even stack several within the same time slot. For example, if you have a course scheduled for February 3-5 (Mon-Wed) at 11:45 AM, you can add another that meets February 6-7 (Thu-Fri), also at 11:45 AM, instead of having to choose between the two.

Make sure to register before the February Shorts lottery on Thursday, January 16.

## SPRING SEMESTER

The spring semester is March 3-May 9. Courses meet for a varying length of time (see each study group for the number of weeks). The membership fee is \$330 and allows you to sign up for three courses in the lottery. After the lottery, when you have received your class assignment letter, you can add a **fourth study group** by logging into your account.

Make sure to register before the spring lottery on Wednesday, February 19.

## Christopher Leinberger, *Reimagining Cities* January 21 10:30-11:30 AM Online via Zoom

Christopher Leinberger is co-founding partner and managing director of Places Platform, a proptech start-up developing a big data analytical platform of 100% of US real estate; and founding partner of Arcadia Land Company, a New Urbanism/transitoriented development firm dedicated to land stewardship and walkable communities, focused on the Philadelphia area. Leinberger established the real estate and urban analysis research programs at George Washington University School of Business and is now an Emeritus Professor.



# Erwin Chemerinsky, *No Democracy Lasts Forever* January 23 10:30-11:30 AM Online via Zoom

Erwin Chemerinsky is an American legal scholar known for his studies of U.S. Constitutional Law and federal civil procedure. Since 2017, Chemerinsky has been the dean of the UC Berkeley School of Law. Previously, he was the inaugural dean of the University of California, Irvine School of Law. from 2008 to 2017. Chemerinsky was named a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2016. The National Jurist magazine named him the most influential person in legal education in the United States in 2017. In 2021, Chemerinsky was named President-elect of the Association of American Law Schools. His latest book is *No Democracy Lasts Forever.* 



# Giovanni Russonello, *Jazz in DC* January 28 10:30-11:30 AM Online via Zoom

Giovanni Russonello is a writer, editor, educator and organizer working at the intersection of music, politics and U.S. history. Gio is presently writing a book about Gil Scott-Heron and Washington, D.C., in the 1970s and '80s, under contract to Metropolitan/Macmillan. A 2024 DC Commission on the Arts & Humanities fellow, he also edits <u>capitalbop.com</u>, an award-winning web magazine covering the D.C. jazz scene, which he co-founded in 2010. The only person to have served as both a politics columnist and a music critic for the New York Times, he has also contributed reporting, reviews and essays to the Atlantic, the Washington Post, NPR Music, JazzTimes, Politico and others.



Richard Bell, *The Reverse Underground Railroad: Slavery and Kidnapping in Pre-Civil War America* January 30 10:00-11:00 AM (*Note different time*) Online via Zoom

Richard Bell is Professor of History at the University of Maryland and author of the book *Stolen: Five Free Boys Kidnapped into Slavery and their Astonishing Odyssey Home* which was a finalist for the George Washington Prize and the Harriet Tubman Prize. He has held major research fellowships at Yale, Cambridge, and the Library of Congress and is the recipient of the National Endowment of the Humanities Public Scholar award and the Andrew Carnegie Fellowship. He serves as a Trustee of the Maryland Center for History and Culture and as a fellow of the Royal Historical Society.
