OLLI Annual Meeting: Fri., April 8 at 1:30 PM

Join us for OLLI's Annual Meeting on Friday, April 8 at 1:30 PM. Board candidates will give brief remarks to introduce themselves. Online balloting will begin after the Annual Meeting and election results will be announced on April 25. Also hear from OLLI's Board Chair, Treasurer, and Executive Director. Time for your questions and comments is an integral part of the Annual Meeting, so we hope you will join us.

The meeting format will be hybrid (members both in-person and online) and will take place in Room A on the first floor. In-person attendees will be required to wear a **mask at all times.** You do not need to register to attend this event in either format. The Zoom link will be sent to all members the morning of the Annual Meeting.

After inviting recommendations from the OLLI membership, this year's Nominating Committee (David Flaxman, Chair; Myra Barron; David Hensler; Diana Jamieson; and Marc Lackritz), has developed a list of four candidates to fill the four positions on the Board of Directors becoming vacant in June 2022. The Committee believes these candidates have amply demonstrated the skills, experience, background, and energy needed for OLLI at AU leadership. The list, which the Board has approved, will appear on the ballot for the election that is scheduled for April. Please note that an asterisk by a candidate's name indicates they're a current Board member. The Board-approved candidates are:



JOHN ALDOCK*

John joined OLLI five years ago after retiring as General Counsel of Goodwin Proctor LLP, an international law firm. He has served on the OLLI Finance Committee and assisted the Board Chair and Executive Director in negotiations with AU over space in our new building and the OLLI endowment. He previously served as Assistant US Attorney for DC, Chair of the Shea and Gardner law firm, Chair of the Advisory Committee on Rules of the US District Court for DC and for many years as a member of the Board of the Legal Clinic for the Homeless.



PENELOPE HANSEN*

Penelope Hansen directed numerous programs at the Environmental Protection Agency during its first 30 years and played a major role in implementing the country's first recycling, hazardous waste, Superfund, acid rain, and environmental technology verification programs. She was educated at Skidmore College, Johns Hopkins University, and the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard. Penny, who joined OLLI in 2010, has devoted much of her retirement to studying the Supreme Court and has given classes on this and other subjects over the last eight years.



LINDA MILLER

Trained professionally as a hospital administrator, Linda's 35-year career in health care focused on nonprofit hospitals and their special relationship to the community—for which she was elected to membership in the National Academy of Medicine in 1997. She has authored multiple articles and oped pieces in the *NY Times, Washington Post, New England Journal of Medicine* and *USA Today*, among others. Linda attended Cornell University (BA '66), Columbia School of Physicians and Surgeons (OTR and MS), and GWU (post-masters); and has lived in the DC area since the early seventies, raising twin daughters. She is an enthusiastic supporter of OLLI—having chaired the Board (2012-2013), and having served as a study group leader teaching health reform.



MARK NADEL*

Mark joined OLLI in 2012 and since then has taught several different courses on public policy, and was a member of the Curriculum Committee. He is currently a member of the Board of Directors and is Chair of the Lecture Committee. Previously, he taught political science at Cornell before joining the Government Accountability Office, where he directed reports on health policy and social welfare. He ended his federal career as an Associate Commissioner of Social Security. Since retiring, he has taught public policy at Georgetown and was a senior fellow at Georgetown's Government Affairs Institute. He has degrees from the University of California (BA) and Johns Hopkins (PhD).

Online balloting will begin after the Annual Meeting and election results will be announced on April 25. Members interested in being placed on the ballot as at-large candidates can do so by filing a self-nomination petition supported by the signatures of 10 OLLI members. Candidates meeting the 10-member signature requirement will automatically appear on the ballot. The deadline for submitting at-large petitions is Friday, April 1. As part of the petition, candidates should provide a photo (a smartphone photo will be fine) and a brief bio of no more than 100 words. Interested candidates should contact the OLLI office for the petition form and other details.

The cutoff for the event is Tuesday, April 12, at 8:00 AM or 35 registrants, whichever comes first.



Spring Valley Building Shuttle Bus Stop Moves Location

Beginning April 4, the Spring Valley Building (SVB) shuttle bus stop will move from its current location (48th St. side of SVB) to the corner of Massachusetts Ave. and 48th St. The shuttle will share the stop with Metro buses.

The Red Express and Green routes will drop off and pick up at the new stop and head back to Tenleytown Metro. An AU shuttle bus-stop sign will be installed under the existing Metro bus sign.

TransLoc also will change the route map and the stop location for the mobile app and desktop version.

Jack Rasmussen, *The Art of Political Engagement (and Why Washington Art Rarely Does)*Friday, April 1

Dr. Jack Rasumussen curated an exhibit on Washington art that led him to a far more inclusive view of the artists of the area, particularly women and artists of color. He has been Director and Curator of the American University Museum since it opened in 2005, where he curated a retrospective of Willem

de Looper in 2008. He currently serves on the board of the Maryland State Arts Council. He earned his BA in Art from Whitman College in Walla Walla, WA, before completing an MFA in Painting, MA in Arts Management, and MA and PhD in Anthropology at American University. He worked in the Education Department of the National Gallery of Art and became Assistant Director of the Washington Project for the Arts when it opened in 1975. He left that position to open the Jack Rasmussen Gallery, helped launch Rockville Arts Place (VisArts), served ten years as Executive Director of Maryland Art Place, and three years as Executive Director of di Rosa in Napa, California.

Serendipity Talk

Nick Glakas, *In the Footsteps of Alexander the Great*Thursday, April 14

Join us for a fascinating journey with one of the most dramatic figures in world history - Alexander the Great. In his short life - he died at 32 - he conquered much of what was then the known world. Future generals of fame, fortune and misfortune such as Julius Caesar, Hannibal, and Napoleon, all accorded Alexander prime of place. It was Julius Caesar who wept when he visited Alexander's tomb in Egypt.

In vast and varied quilt of territory, his conquests encompassed such modern day countries as Greece, Albania, Bulgaria, Romania, Turkey, Syria, Lebanon, Egypt, Iraq, Iran, Afghanistan, Uzbekistan, Tajikistan, Kazakhstan, and Kyrgyzstan. In his last pitched battle in India, he met and bested King Porus and an army of 50,000, including 4,000 cavalry, 300 chariots, and 200 fierce, battle-tested war elephants.

His signal achievement was the destruction of the Persian Empire; his major accomplishment was the flow of Greek culture to Asia. As Arrian, one of his biographers reminds us, "It is a lovely thing to live with courage and to die, leaving behind an everlasting renown."

Zoom Tips

Zoom has released some updates that are important for **Chromebook users** and for those who would like to change their **view** in-meeting:

• If you use a Chromebook (the device, not the Chrome browser), Zoom will no longer work. You need to download the **Progressive Web Application** from the Google Play Store

(https://play.google.com/store/apps/details?id=us.zoom.pwa.twa).

• **Hide your self-view.** Zoom meetings automatically begin in Speaker View. Hover over the video of yourself. Click the ellipses to reveal the menu. Choose **Hide Self View**. To restore your self-view, click the **View** button in the upper right screen, then click **Show Self View**.
