Predicting the Next President: The Keys to the White House 2016

Forget the polls. Dismiss the pundits. Ignore the campaign news cycle. Professor Allan J. Lichtman has developed a system for predicting the behavior of American voters that is so accurate he has successfully predicted the outcome of every presidential election since 1984. Spurning the usual approach of demographics, analytics, and polling, Lichtman believes the American electorate to be smarter and more pragmatic than it is often given credit for and will reward the political party

that serves it well and punish those that fail. His thirteen keys are true/false statements that he says indicate whether the incumbent party will be able to hold onto the White House. Will he continue his winning streak in the 2016 election?

Allan J. Lichtman is Distinguished Professor of History at American University and the author or co-author of nine books and more than 100 articles. He has testified as an expert witness on civil rights in more than 90 cases and regularly provides media commentary and analysis. His 2013 book FDR and the Jews won the National Jewish Book Award. "Predicting the Next President: The Keys to the White House 2016" updates the forecasting system Professor Lichtman initially developed in 1981 with Russian mathematician Vladimir Kellis-Borok.

Marty Nemirow: Age of Ambition, by Evan Osnos. a

and bureaucrats of one regime are punished by succeeding regimes. The author spent years on China taking risks by befriending the main controversial characters.

Cindy Lisec: I moved this summer and while I was unpacking I listened to several of the books from the amusing cozy Fethering mystery series by Simon Brett. *Body on the Beach* introduces the retirees Carole and Jude, who are neighbors and opposites in personality and experience. Mary Beard's readable *SPQR* explores the growth of Rome from 63 BCE to 212 CE. She identifies why Rome grew and what bound together its citizens.

The Year of Lear (1606), by James Shapiro, links the social, political and cultural events, especially the *Gunpowder Plot*, to show how they may have influenced Shakespeare while he wrote King Lear, Antony and Cleopatra, and Macbeth.

Sy Efros: My favorites were: World of Yesterday, by Stefan Zweig; Citizens of London, by Lynn Olson, and Dead Wake, by Erik Larson. Zweig's pictures of pre-Nazi Vienna and Paris are riveting. He met a tragic end. Olson's description of the broadcaster Edward R. Murrow, US Ambassador John Gilbert Winant, and Averell Harriman (who was in London to direct our Lend-Lease program) are vivid. She also describes the Churchill family and Roosevelt so as to make them true-to-life figures. Finally, Larson's Dead Wake is a good picture of WWI and the events that led us into that war.



Joy Mara: I tend to read mostly literary fiction, with recent titles including: The Last Painting of Sara DeVos, Dominic Smith; Seeing Calvin Coolidge in a Dream, John Derbyshire; Capital, John Lancaster; and Roscoe, William Kennedy. I also read a couple of nonfiction books: The German War, Nicholas Starrgardt; and Tsukiji: The Fish Market at the Center of the World, Theodore Bester. In addition, I try to read some French each day, including Les Vingt Ans du Jeune Homme Vert, Michel Deon; and Les Goldmans de Baltimore, Joel Dicker. I did some light reading, such as Love in Scotland Street, Alexander McCall Smith; Even Dogs in the Wild, Ian Rankin; and Cometh the Hour, Jeffrey Archer.

Larry Walders: I read *Everybody's Fool* by Richard Russo. It follows his best seller *Nobody's Fool*.

Both are set on a depressed area of upstate New York with a cast of bizarre characters who go through episodes of hilarious and semi-tragic experiences. The writing is entertaining and also provides insights into small-town life.

Dorothy Wexler: I did a mishmash of reading this summer. I started with a book I've been longing to get to: Leningrad, Siege and Symphony by Brian Moynahan, a long book focused on Shostakovich composing his Seventh Symphony during the siege of Leningrad, following up with the new novel by Julian Barnes, *The Noise of Time*, also about Shostakovich. The Barnes was a present as were a couple of other books I read: A Thousand Miles to Freedom, by Eunsun Kim about her escape from North Korea and *Memories from Moscow to the Black Sea,* by the Russian journalist "Teffi." For book groups I belong to, I read the extraordinary World War I novel by the Irish author Sebastian Barry, A Long Long Way and Disraeli: The Novel Politician by David Cesarini, which examines how "Jewish" Disraeli was. Then for fun: Love in a Cold Climate by Nancy Mitford and *Imperium: A Novel of Ancient Rome,* by the incomparable Robert Harris (in anticipation of the Roman history class which I was lucky to get into).

Andrew Solomon, Far From The Tree; Dara Horn, A
Guide For the Perplexed and On All Other Nights; M.L.
Stedman, A Light Between the Oceans; Anne Tyler, A
