Fall Feedback



After decades of taking and accumulating photos from our lives and our family's, we have too many photos to store yet too many memories to toss away. By scanning and digitizing your analog photos, those memories can always be shared, stored, and enjoyed for decades to come. Scanning apps like Photomyne make digitizing your photos easy while maintaining the quality of original photos. This course will explain why you should digitize your photos, how to digitize your photos, and how to use scanning apps to not only save your photos but also cherish the stories behind them. Class participants are encouraged to download the Photomyne app (there is a free trial - no purchase is required for the class), as well as come to the session with photos for scanning practice.

Claudia Kalb is a *New York Times* bestselling author and independent journalist who reports on health, science, culture, and human behavior. Her most recent book, *Spark: How Genius Ignites, From Child Prodigies to Late Bloomers*, focuses on creativity and inspiration in 13 great achievers, from Isaac Newton and Yo-Yo Ma to Maya Angelou and Eleanor Roosevelt. In her work for *National Geographic* magazine, Claudia is exploring genius through the lens of biography, history, culture, and science. In her books, she investigates the attributes of individuals who have soared to great heights —throughout history and today. Her first book, *Andy Warhol Was a Hoarder: Inside the Minds of*

History's Great Personalities, delves into the challenges and triumphs of 12 icons, including Albert Einstein, Charles Darwin, and Marilyn Monroe.

Just Medicine: A Cure for Racial Inequality in American Health Care

Dayna Matthew

As Dean of the George Washington University Law School since 2020, Dayna Matthew is the first woman to hold that position. She is an expert in issues of health equity and public health policy. Previously, she was at the University of Virginia Law School as the William L. Matheson and Robert M. Morgenthau Distinguished Professor of Law and was a professor of public health sciences at the UVA School of Medicine. She served as Director of the Equity Center at UVA, which works to builds relationships between the university and its surrounding community to address racial and socioeconomic inequality. She also is a non-resident fellow in the Center for Health Policy at the Brookings Institution. A prolific writer, she is author of the recent book *Just Medicine: A Cure for Racial Inequality in American Health Care* and has authored or co-authored dozens of book chapters and articles, focusing largely on health care reform, public health law, health disparities, patient protection, and antitrust laws and civil rights.

The ten chapters explore: why women's leadership has been so effective and why its important now; wisdom from Eastern healing and spiritual traditions; how our emotions subconsciously shape our behavior and life decisions; charting our second half of life with renewed vigor and grace; living a more resilient, peaceful life even during a crisis; how we transform gender norms and educate men and boys; and tuning our moral compass to live a more enriching life. **She and her husband Carl, who co-authored four chapters, will highlight together several key themes covered in their OLLI courses.**
